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
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




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## Letter from the Editor **Every Vote Counts**

## Letter from the Executive Board

## **Election Day**

While researching a little for this month's issue a certain children's book and an article from the writer stood out to me as a perfect example of how to approach the issue of politics to our toddlers and younger children. I love how at no point the writers of the book make any political commentary, despite their clear interest in politics. The book aims at explaining what an election is like to young children. For older children it's a fantastic starting point to look deeper into the election, into democracy and into politics.

One of my favorite pictures of my children is the two of them, aged one and a half and three and a half, holding up our polling cards outside a polling station sign. My husband and I had taken them with us when we cast our votes in the local and European elections.

We explained what we were doing and how it worked, and why we were voting the way we were. Although we cared deeply about the results – we met through our involvement in politics – the third of these was the least important.

People are still a bit squeamish about the idea of 'politicizing' children. It tends to conjure up images of kids brandishing placards, serving their parents' political agenda.

We wanted our children to understand what democracy means, what a vote is and why exercising it is important. We wanted to completely normalize political participation so that our children do not grow up as non-voters.

#### Our children's lives are political every day

From the moment our children are conceived their lives are influenced by politics. In the womb and

and during labor, every time I saw a midwife, and now, every time my children have an appointment with a doctor or receive a free prescription - they were and are benefiting from political decisions.

They have had nursery provision paid for first by the childcare vouchers we saved and then by the government's free provision. They've been to free sessions at children's centers. As they approach school age, we are applying for six local state primaries varying from 'good' to 'requires improvement'.

Their lives are political every day, and that's before we even start thinking about the food they eat, the house they live in and the passports they own.

Contrary to the popular belief that politicians and the rest of us are locked in an 'us versus them' battle, that we're a different breed, I think it's incredibly important for children to realize that politicians should represent us.

Our representatives should come from all classes, races, sexualities, genders and ages. We need to show children, from very early on, that politics isn't just something 'other people do' – it's our lives.

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## **ASK THE EXPERT: Politics**

#### A Parent's Guide to Talking About the Presidential Election by PBSPARENTS



No matter what your political beliefs, there's one thing parents can agree on: We'll be inundated with election coverage over the next few weeks. Chances are that your child has begun to notice campaign signs, television commercials, news coverage, T-shirts, bumper stickers, buttons and conversations about the election.

Increased campaign coverage may also bring interesting questions from your child. While even young children can get caught up in the excitement of a campaign, they may be confused about how it works. Here are some questions your kids may ask, along with ideas on how to phrase your response:

What is voting?

Who can vote?

Why can't kids vote?

Why should people vote?

Can I come to the party?

Can I become president?

What does the President do?

What do donkeys and elephants have to do with being president?

How can kids get involved in the election?

#### What is voting?

You can explain to preschoolers that voting is a way for a group to make a decision. Family members can cast votes for a favorite meal, favorite book or favorite weekend activity.

#### Who can vote?

School-age children are ready to learn that when this country began, the Founding Fathers wrote a constitution describing how we would govern ourselves. It said people should vote but didn't say who could vote. That was left to each state to decide, which created problems. In the past, people were denied the right to vote because of social class, gender or ethnic origin. Now after centuries of protest, four amendments to the Constitution and several new laws, all U.S. citizens, 18 years or older, are allowed to vote.

#### Why can't kids vote?

Kids who get caught up in election excitement may be disappointed to learn that they don't get a vote. Explain to them that in order to vote in this country, you have to meet citizenship, residency and age requirements, meaning you have to be at least 18. But remind kids that even if they can't vote in the presidential election, they can still vote in class, with their family or with a group of friends.

#### Why should people vote?

Raise a future voter by teaching children about the importance of making their voices heard. Tell them that despite the struggle to extend the vote to all American citizens over 18, only 64 percent of U.S. citizens age 18 and over voted in the 2004 presidential election. Explain that because a surprising number of elections are determined by small margins, it's important for all eligible voters to participate at the local and national level.

#### Can I come to the party?

You may need to teach young children that that a political party isn't the same as a birthday party -- even though they'll see lots of balloons, confetti and dancing if they watch a convention on TV. Show kids that political parties are groups of people with similar interests who join together to support candidates. School-age children have probably heard of the Democrats and Republicans. Introduce them to other parties, too, like the Green Party, the Libertarians and the Progressives. Remind them that voters can just be independents and not join a party at all.

#### Can I become president?

Tell your aspiring world leader that, according to the Constitution, a person must meet three conditions to be eligible to become president. An individual must:

- 1. be a citizen who was born in the United States
- 2. have lived in the United States for fourteen years
- 3. be at least 35 years old

#### What does the President do?

Children may understand that the President leads the nation, but you can explain that he also serves as the head of the military, makes agreements with other nations and chooses people to hold important government jobs. He doesn't do it on his own, however. Introduce kids to the three branches of government: the Legislative, which includes Congress; the Judicial, which includes the Supreme Court; and the Executive, which includes the President, Vice President and Cabinet. Each branch can limit the powers of the other so none becomes too powerful.

#### What do donkeys and elephants have to do with being president?

Political symbols can be a fun topic to explore with children, since they have roots in something kids love: cartoons. Tell children that before TV, radio and the Internet, political parties used printed materials to attract and educate voters. Political cartoonist Thomas Nast (the same man who created our modern image of Santa Claus) drew a cartoon of a Democratic donkey and a Republican elephant in the late 1870s. These symbols have since become official mascots of their parties.

Invite young children to draw their own cartoon symbols for causes they believe in, whether they're helping animals, saving the earth or raising money for a children's charity.

#### How can kids get involved in the election?

Let kids know that even though they can't vote, they can encourage the adults in their life to register to vote and to campaign for their favorite causes and candidates. Future voters can also pass out fliers, help at polling places (in some states), listen to debates and wear buttons or T-shirts for their favorite nominee.

# Recipe Mama

#### Rigatoni with Pepperoni and Mozzarella Jonnika Benjamin

#### **Ingredients:**

Kosher salt

12 ounces rigatoni

3 ounces sliced pepperoni, halved (about <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup)

1 onion, chopped

1 green bell pepper, thinly sliced

2 garlic cloves, minced

1 28-ounce can whole peeled tomatoes, crushed well by

hand\* (let kids help!)

1 teaspoon dried oregano

Freshly ground pepper

½ cup grated parmesan cheese, plus more for topping

6 ounces fresh mozzarella, diced (about 1 cup)

Red pepper flakes



#### **Directions:**

Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add the pasta and cook as the label directs. Reserve ½ cup cooking water, then drain.

Meanwhile, cook the pepperoni in a separate large pot or Dutch oven over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until just crisp, 5 to 7 minutes. Transfer to a plate using a slotted spoon. Add the onion, bell pepper and garlic to the pot.

Cook, stirring occasionally, until the vegetables soften, about 10 minutes.

Add 1 cup water, the tomatoes, oregano, ½ teaspoon salt and a few grins of pepper to the pot. Reduce the heat to medium low; simmer until the sauce thickens slightly, 10 minutes.

Add the pasta and parmesan; toss to coat, adding the reserved cooking water as needed to loosen. Remove from the heat and stir in the mozzarella and pepperoni; season with salt and pepper. Top each serving with a pinch of red pepper flakes and more parmesan.

\*Let the kids crush the tomatoes. Empty the can into a bowl and show them how to crush by hand.

## Why use playdates and playgroups for your children?



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



## CRAFT CORNER



#### **Mood Meters**

Kids spend a lot of time learning how to work in groups, whether that means doing projects, joining in during circle time, or playing outdoors together. This goes great when everyone is feeling happy, but it's also important to teach kids how to recognize when they are upset and when others are upset. Teach your child at home with this tool that borrows the famous color coding of the U.S. Fire Service. Have your child help you create a family sign that warns other family members if she's feeling stressed or upset. This is a tool the entire family can use. She'll learn to decode her moods (and yours) and will improve her reading and writing skills at the same time.

#### What You Need:

- Piece of poster board, 22"x 13"
- Compass and Ruler
- Heavy construction paper in red, orange, yellow, green, and black
- Metal paper fastener ("brad")
- Markers

#### What You Do:

- 1. Place the poster board horizontally on a table surface.
- 2. On the top, write a title such as, "Right Now, I Feel..."
- 3. Use your compass to make a large half-circle in the middle of your poster.
- 4. Then, use your ruler to divide the half-circle in half, and then divide each of the halves in half, so that you have four "slices" marked off.
- 5. Cut out a pie shape the same size as the "slices" on the half-circle using each color of construction paper—one green, one yellow, one orange, and one red.
- 6. Help your kid glue the colors from left to right across the half-circle in this order: green, yellow, orange, and red.
- 7. On the green slice, write "Calm and happy." For the yellow write "A little upset." In the orange section, "Very upset." In the red, write, "Exploding!" or any word that indicates she's extremely upset. Get creative!
- 8. Together with your child, cut out a 6" long arrow from the black construction paper, and attach it to the poster board with the metal fastener. The arrow should be attached to the center of the flat side on the half-circle.
- 9. If she wants, have your child use markers to add any other decorations on the poster.
- 10. Put the "mood fire safety" meter in a prominent place at home, like the kitchen or the living room, and encourage your family to use it whenever the time seems right.
- 11. Invite your child to pay attention to how she's feeling and to talk about it. With luck, you'll have many happy days ahead, safely in that nice green zone.

## **Going to the Library**

We also try to use our library voices before going to the library. I explain to him that it's a special place with special rules and one of the most important one is to keep our voice down. Take turns whispering to each other before arriving and keep reminding each other often!



Get your little one a library card. Their old enough to go to the library then they're probably old enough for their very first library card. My guy loves to scan the card, books and check them out himself.
